Pamela B. Deters, PhD (Cherokee/Choctaw) is the president of the Society of Indian Psychologists (SIP) and a clinical psychologist, licensed in Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alaska (inactive). She also serves as the Treasurer for the American Psychological Association, Division 35, Section 6 (Indigenous Women in Psychology). She currently works in private practice and consultation, conducting psychological and psychoeducational evaluations with child, adolescent, adult, and geriatric populations. She was formerly an Associate Professor at the University of Alaska Fairbanks, in Fairbanks, Alaska, where she served on the faculty in the Department of Psychology from 2002-2007. Her expertise is in the area of trauma among diverse ethnic groups, with an emphasis on American Indian and Alaska Native mental health. Her NIMH-sponsored research investigated trauma among Native children, families, and communities, with a particular emphasis on cultural revitalization and resilience subsequent to trauma. She has served as the Statewide Director of Alaska Natives into Psychology (ANPsych), a training program supporting American Indian and Alaska Native graduate and undergraduate students pursuing careers in psychology, and was recognized as a National Center for Minority Health Disparities (NCMHD) Scholar. Dr. Deters has also worked extensively in the training of minority and underserved psychology students, at the doctoral, master's, and undergraduate level, as well as supervision of pre-doctoral interns and post-doctoral psychologists seeking licensure.
