Fiscal Year 2023 Appropriations Bill At-A-Glance



Provides **\$242.1 billion, a 13 percent increase**, to create jobs and support workers, help middle class and working families with the cost of living, bolster biomedical research and public health infrastructure, and advance equal treatment for women

Creates American Jobs and Protects American Workers

- Invests in job training and apprenticeship programs with \$11.8 billion for the Employment and Training Administration, including \$303 million for Registered Apprenticeships and \$100 million to continue and expand Strengthening Community College Training Grants
- Supports workers with \$2.2 billion for Worker Protection agencies, including the Wage and Hour Division and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration

Helps Middle Class and Working Families with the Cost of Living

- Expands affordable early-learning programs with \$7.2 billion for the Child Care and Development Block Grant, \$12.4 billion for Head Start, and \$350 million for Preschool Development Grants
- Grows opportunity with transformative investments in education, including for high-poverty schools with \$20.5 billion for Title I Grants and for students with disabilities with \$17.8 billion for Special Education programs
- Increases access to post-secondary education with more funding for Career, Technical and Adult Education, Higher Education, and Student Financial Assistance, including a \$500 increase in the maximum Pell Grant

Advances Equal Treatment for Women

- Increases funding to \$500 million for the health services covered by Title X, including family planning, and continues to fund Planned Parenthood and other health clinics
- Repeals the discriminatory Hyde Amendment that denies low-income women access to necessary reproductive health care

Bolsters Biomedical Research and Public Health Infrastructure

- Accelerates the pace of scientific breakthroughs for diseases such as ALS, Alzheimer's, diabetes, and cancer with \$47.5 billion for the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and \$2.75 billion for the Advanced Research Projects Agency for Health
- Supports public health efforts and helps states and local governments strengthen infrastructure and capacity with \$10.5 billion for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)
- Addresses our most urgent health crises with over \$1 billion for maternal and child health, \$3.8 billion for mental health, and \$4.8 billion for substance use treatment
- Increases funding for gun violence prevention research at NIH and CDC
- Makes strides to reduce persistent and unacceptable health disparities with an increase of \$100 million for research at NIH
