### A BILL

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2018, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
4	money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
5	Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September
6	30, 2018, and for other purposes, namely:

10	SALARIES AND EXPENSES
11	For salaries and expenses of the House of Represent-
12	atives, \$1,194,050,766, as follows:
13	House Leadership Offices
14	For salaries and expenses, as authorized by law,
15	\$22,278,891, including: Office of the Speaker,
16	\$6,645,417, including \$25,000 for official expenses of the
17	Speaker; Office of the Majority Floor Leader, \$2,180,048,

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\$1,492,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the 1 Parliamentarian, including the Parliamentarian, \$2,000 2 3 for preparing the Digest of Rules, and not more than 4 \$1,000 for official representation and reception expenses, 5 \$2,037,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Law Revision Counsel of the House, \$3,209,000; for sala-6 7 ries and expenses of the Office of the Legislative Counsel 8 of the House, \$9,437,000; for salaries and expenses of the 9 Office of Interparliamentary Affairs, \$814,000; for other 10 authorized employees, \$584,000.

#### Allowances and Expenses

12 For allowances and expenses as authorized by House 13 resolution or law, \$260,704,004, including: supplies, materials, administrative costs and Federal tort claims, 14 15 \$3,625,000; official mail for committees, leadership offices, and administrative offices of the House, \$190,000; 16 17 Government contributions for health, retirement, Social 18 Security, other applicable employee and benefits, 19 \$233,540,004, to remain available until March 31, 2019; Business Continuity and Disaster Recovery, \$16,186,000 2021 of which \$5,000,000 shall remain available until expended; 22 transition activities for new members and staff, 23 \$2,273,000, to remain available until expended; Wounded 24 Warrior Program \$2,500,000, to remain available until 25 expended; Office of Congressional Ethics, \$1,670,000; and

miscellaneous items including purchase, exchange, mainte nance, repair and operation of House motor vehicles,
 interparliamentary receptions, and gratuities to heirs of
 deceased employees of the House, \$720,000.

#### 5 Administrative Provisions

6 REQUIRING AMOUNTS REMAINING IN MEMBERS' REP7 RESENTATIONAL ALLOWANCES TO BE USED FOR
8 DEFICIT REDUCTION OR TO REDUCE THE FEDERAL
9 DEBT

10 SEC. 101. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any amounts appropriated under this Act for 11 12 "HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—SALARIES AND 13 EXPENSES—MEMBERS' Representational ALLOW-ANCES" shall be available only for fiscal year 2018. Any 14 15 amount remaining after all payments are made under such allowances for fiscal year 2018 shall be deposited in the 16 Treasury and used for deficit reduction (or, if there is no 17 Federal budget deficit after all such payments have been 18 made, for reducing the Federal debt, in such manner as 19 the Secretary of the Treasury considers appropriate). 20

(b) REGULATIONS.—The Committee on House Administration of the House of Representatives shall have
authority to prescribe regulations to carry out this section.
(c) DEFINITION.—As used in this section, the term
"Member of the House of Representatives" means a Rep-

resentative in, or a Delegate or Resident Commissioner
 to, the Congress.

3 DELIVERY OF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

4 SEC. 102. None of the funds made available in this 5 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of a bill, joint 6 resolution, or resolution to the office of a Member of the 7 House of Representatives (including a Delegate or Resi-8 dent Commissioner to the Congress) unless the Member 9 requests a copy.

10 DELIVERY OF CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

11 SEC. 103. None of the funds made available by this 12 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of any version 13 of the Congressional Record to the office of a Member of 14 the House of Representatives (including a Delegate or 15 Resident Commissioner to the Congress).

16 LIMITATION ON AMOUNT AVAILABLE TO LEASE VEHICLES 17 SEC. 104. None of the funds made available in this Act may be used by the Chief Administrative Officer of 18 19 the House of Representatives to make any payments from 20any Members' Representational Allowance for the leasing 21 of a vehicle, excluding mobile district offices, in an aggre-22 gate amount that exceeds \$1,000 for the vehicle in any 23 month.

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LIMITATION ON PRINTED COPIES OF U.S. CODE TO

#### HOUSE

3 SEC. 105. None of the funds made available by this
4 Act may be used to provide an aggregate number of more
5 than 50 printed copies of any edition of the United States
6 Code to all offices of the House of Representatives.

DELIVERY OF REPORTS OF DISBURSEMENTS

8 SEC. 106. None of the funds made available by this 9 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of the report 10 of disbursements for the operations of the House of Representatives under section 106 of the House of Represent-11 12 atives Administrative Reform Technical Corrections Act 13 (2 U.S.C. 5535) to the office of a Member of the House of Representatives (including a Delegate or Resident Com-14 15 missioner to the Congress).

#### DELIVERY OF DAILY CALENDAR

17 SEC. 107. None of the funds made available by this 18 Act may be used to deliver to the office of a Member of 19 the House of Representatives (including a Delegate or 20 Resident Commissioner to the Congress) a printed copy 21 of the Daily Calendar of the House of Representatives 22 which is prepared by the Clerk of the House of Represent-23 atives.

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1 DELIVERY OF CONGRESSIONAL PICTORIAL DIRECTORY

2 SEC. 108. None of the funds made available by this 3 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of the Congres-4 sional Pictorial Directory to the office of a Member of the 5 House of Representatives (including a Delegate or Resi-6 dent Commissioner to the Congress).

7 AMENDING THE HOUSE SERVICES REVOLVING FUND

8 SEC. 109. (a) COLLECTION OF CERTAIN SERVICE 9 FEES.—Section 105(a) of the Legislative Branch Appro-10 priations Act, 2005 (2 U.S.C. 5545(a)) is amended by 11 adding at the end the following new paragraph:

"(7) The collection of a service fee from vendors of the Master Web Services Agreement or the
Technology Services Contract for failure to abide by
and maintain House of Representatives security policies.".

17 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendment made by18 subsection (a) shall take effect on the date of the enact-19 ment of this Act.

20 Adjustments to compensation

SEC. 110. Not withstanding any other provision of
law, no adjustment shall be made under section 601(a)
of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 (2 U.S.C.
4501) (relating to cost of living adjustments for Members
of Congress) during fiscal year 2018.

18 Administrative Provision

19 SEC. 1001. (a) ESTABLISHMENT OF SENIOR LEVEL 20 POSITIONS.—Notwithstanding any order issued by the 21 Speaker of the House of Representatives pursuant to 22 paragraph (1) of section 311(d) of the Legislative Branch 23 Appropriations Act, 1988 (2 U.S.C. 4532(1)), the chair 24 of the Joint Committee on Taxation may establish and 25 fix the compensation of senior level positions in the staff of the Joint Committee to meet critical scientific, tech nical, professional, or executive needs of the Joint Com mittee.

4 (b) LIMITATION ON COMPENSATION.—The annual
5 rate of pay for any position established under this section
6 may not exceed the annual rate of pay for level II of the
7 Executive Schedule.

8 (c) CONFORMING AMENDMENT.— Subsection (e) of
9 section 214 of the Postal Revenue and Federal Salary Act
10 of 1967 (2 U.S.C. 4302) is repealed.

(d) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply with
respect to fiscal year 2018 and each succeeding fiscal year.

#### SALARIES

15 For salaries of employees of the Capitol Police, including overtime, hazardous duty pay, and Government 16 contributions for health, retirement, social security, pro-17 fessional liability insurance, and other applicable employee 18 benefits, \$347,700,000 of which overtime shall not exceed 19 20 \$45,000,000 unless the Committee on Appropriations of 21 the House and Senate are notified, to be disbursed by the 22 Chief of the Capitol Police or his designee.

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#### GENERAL EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Capitol Police, includ-ing motor vehicles, communications and other equipment,

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security equipment and installation, uniforms, weapons, 1 2 supplies, materials, training, medical services, forensic 3 services, stenographic services, personal and professional services, the employee assistance program, the awards pro-4 5 gram, postage, communication services, travel advances, 6 relocation of instructor and liaison personnel for the Fed-7 eral Law Enforcement Training Center, and not more 8 than \$5,000 to be expended on the certification of the 9 Chief of the Capitol Police in connection with official rep-10 resentation and reception expenses, \$74,800,000, to be 11 disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol Police or his des-12 ignee: *Provided*, That, notwithstanding any other provi-13 sion of law, the cost of basic training for the Capitol Police at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center for fis-14 cal year 2018 shall be paid by the Secretary of Homeland 15 Security from funds available to the Department of Home-16 17 land Security.

- 18 OFFICE OF COMPLIANCE
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#### SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For salaries and expenses of the Office of Compliance, as authorized by section 305 of the Congressional Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1385), \$3,959,000, of which \$450,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2019: *Provided*, That not more than \$500 may be expended on the certification of the Executive Director of

the Office of Compliance in connection with official rep resentation and reception expenses.

3 CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE
4 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For salaries and expenses necessary for operation of
the Congressional Budget Office, including not more than
\$6,000 to be expended on the certification of the Director
of the Congressional Budget Office in connection with official representation and reception expenses, \$48,500,000.

11 CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION AND OPERATIONS

12 For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, and 13 other personal services, at rates of pay provided by law; for all necessary expenses for surveys and studies, con-14 15 struction, operation, and general and administrative support in connection with facilities and activities under the 16 17 care of the Architect of the Capitol including the Botanic 18 Garden; electrical substations of the Capitol, Senate and House office buildings, and other facilities under the juris-19 diction of the Architect of the Capitol; including fur-2021 nishings and office equipment; including not more than 22 \$5,000 for official reception and representation expenses, 23 to be expended as the Architect of the Capitol may ap-24 prove; for purchase or exchange, maintenance, and oper-25 ation of a passenger motor vehicle, \$93,000,000.

CAPITOL BUILDING
 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
 and operation of the Capitol, \$45,300,000, of which
 \$19,458,000 shall remain available until September 30,
 2022.

CAPITOL GROUNDS

- 7 For all necessary expenses for care and improvement 8 of grounds surrounding the Capitol, the Senate and House 9 office buildings, and the Capitol Power Plant, 10 \$13,333,000, of which \$3,195,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2022. 11
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#### HOUSE OFFICE BUILDINGS

13 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care 14 of the House office and operation buildings, 15 \$165,294,000, of which \$45,130,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2022, and of which \$62,000,000 16 17 shall remain available until expended for the restoration 18 and renovation of the Cannon House Office Building.

In addition, for a payment to the House Historic
Buildings Revitalization Trust Fund, \$10,000,000, to remain available until expended.

#### CAPITOL POWER PLANT

For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
and operation of the Capitol Power Plant; lighting, heating, power (including the purchase of electrical energy)

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and water and sewer services for the Capitol, Senate and 1 House office buildings, Library of Congress buildings, and 2 the grounds about the same, Botanic Garden, Senate ga-3 4 rage, and air conditioning refrigeration not supplied from 5 plants in any of such buildings; heating the Government Publishing Office and Washington City Post Office, and 6 heating and chilled water for air conditioning for the Su-7 8 preme Court Building, the Union Station complex, the 9 Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Building and the 10 Folger Shakespeare Library, expenses for which shall be advanced or reimbursed upon request of the Architect of 11 the Capitol and amounts so received shall be deposited 12 13 into the Treasury to the credit of this appropriation, \$106,694,000, of which \$28,057,000 shall remain avail-14 15 able until September 30, 2022: Provided, That not more than \$9,000,000 of the funds credited or to be reimbursed 16 to this appropriation as herein provided shall be available 17 18 for obligation during fiscal year 2018.

For all necessary expenses for the mechanical and structural maintenance, care and operation of the Library buildings and grounds, \$76,097,000, of which \$48,724,000 shall remain available until September 30, 24 2022.

1 CAPITOL POLICE BUILDINGS, GROUNDS AND SECURITY

For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care and operation of buildings, grounds and security enhancements of the United States Capitol Police, wherever located, the Alternate Computer Facility, and Architect of the Capitol security operations, \$33,249,000, of which \$12,300,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2022.

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#### BOTANIC GARDEN

10 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care and operation of the Botanic Garden and the nurseries, 11 12 buildings, grounds, and collections; and purchase and ex-13 change, maintenance, repair, and operation of a passenger motor vehicle; all under the direction of the Joint Com-14 15 mittee on the Library, \$13,400,000, of which \$2,600,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2022: Provided, 16 That, of the amount made available under this heading, 17 the Architect of the Capitol may obligate and expend such 18 19 sums as may be necessary for the maintenance, care and operation of the National Garden established under sec-20 21 tion 307E of the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 22 1989 (2 U.S.C. 2146), upon vouchers approved by the Architect of the Capitol or a duly authorized designee. 23

1 CAPITOL VISITOR CENTER 2 For all necessary expenses for the operation of the Capitol Visitor Center, \$21,470,000. 3 4 Administrative Provisions 5 NO BONUSES FOR CONTRACTORS BEHIND SCHEDULE OR 6 OVER BUDGET 7 SEC. 1101. None of the funds made available in this 8 Act for the Architect of the Capitol may be used to make 9 incentive or award payments to contractors for work on 10 contracts or programs for which the contractor is behind schedule or over budget, unless the Architect of the Cap-11 itol, or agency-employed designee, determines that any 12 13 such deviations are due to unforeseeable events, government-driven scope changes, or are not significant within 14 15 the overall scope of the project and/or program.

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#### SCRIMS

SEC. 1102. None of the funds made available by this
Act may be used for scrims containing photographs of
building facades during restoration or construction
projects performed by the Architect of the Capitol.

For all necessary expenses of the Library of Congress
not otherwise provided for, including development and
maintenance of the Library's catalogs; custody and custo-

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dial care of the Library buildings; special clothing; clean-1 ing, laundering and repair of uniforms; preservation of 2 motion pictures in the custody of the Library; operation 3 4 and maintenance of the American Folklife Center in the 5 Library; preparation and distribution of catalog records and other publications of the Library; hire or purchase 6 7 of one passenger motor vehicle; and expenses of the Li-8 brary of Congress Trust Fund Board not properly charge-9 able to the income of any trust fund held by the Board, 10 \$464,209,234, of which not more than \$6,000,000 shall be derived from collections credited to this appropriation 11 during fiscal year 2018, and shall remain available until 12 13 expended, under the Act of June 28, 1902 (chapter 1301; 32 Stat. 480; 2 U.S.C. 150) and not more than \$350,000 14 15 shall be derived from collections during fiscal year 2018 and shall remain available until expended for the develop-16 ment and maintenance of an international legal informa-17 tion database and activities related thereto: *Provided*, 18 19 That the Library of Congress may not obligate or expend 20any funds derived from collections under the Act of June 21 28, 1902, in excess of the amount authorized for obliga-22 tion or expenditure in appropriations Acts: Provided fur-23 ther, That the total amount available for obligation shall 24 be reduced by the amount by which collections are less 25 than \$6,350,000: Provided further, That, of the total

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amount appropriated, not more than \$12,000 may be ex-1 2 pended, on the certification of the Librarian of Congress, 3 in connection with official representation and reception ex-4 penses for the Overseas Field Offices: Provided further, 5 That, of the total amount appropriated, \$8,653,000 shall remain available until expended for the digital collections 6 7 and educational curricula program: *Provided further*, 8 That, of the total amount appropriated, \$1,300,000 shall 9 remain available until expended for upgrade of the Legis-10 lative Branch Financial Management System.

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#### SALARIES AND EXPENSES

3 For all necessary expenses to carry out the provisions 4 of section 203 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 5 1946 (2 U.S.C. 166) and to revise and extend the Annotated Constitution of the United States of America, 6 \$111,474,000: Provided, That no part of such amount 7 8 may be used to pay any salary or expense in connection 9 with any publication, or preparation of material therefor 10 (except the Digest of Public General Bills), to be issued by the Library of Congress unless such publication has 11 12 obtained prior approval of either the Committee on House Administration of the House of Representatives or the 13 Committee on Rules and Administration of the Senate. 14

Whenever in this Act any office or position 10 not specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of 1929 (46 Stat. 32 et seq.) is appropriated for or the rate 11 12 of compensation or designation of any office or position 13 appropriated for is different from that specifically established by such Act, the rate of compensation and the des-14 15 ignation in this Act shall be the permanent law with respect thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions in this Act 16 for the various items of official expenses of Members, offi-17 cers, and committees of the Senate and House of Rep-18 resentatives, and clerk hire for Senators and Members of 19 20 the House of Representatives shall be the permanent law 21 with respect thereto.

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CONSULTING SERVICES

SEC. 204. The expenditure of any appropriation

Amounts available for administrative ex-8 penses of any legislative branch entity which participates 9 in the Legislative Branch Financial Managers Council 10 (LBFMC) established by charter on March 26, 1996, shall be available to finance an appropriate share of LBFMC 11 12 costs as determined by the LBFMC, except that the total LBFMC costs to be shared among all participating legisla-13 tive branch entities (in such allocations among the entities 14 15 as the entities may determine) may not exceed \$2,000. 16 LIMITATION ON TRANSFERS

SEC. 206. None of the funds made available in this
Act may be transferred to any department, agency, or instrumentality of the United States Government, except
pursuant to a transfer made by, or transfer authority provided in, this Act or any other appropriation Act.

22 GUIDED TOURS OF THE CAPITOL

SEC. 207. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b),
none of the funds made available to the Architect of the
Capitol in this Act may be used to eliminate or restrict

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guided tours of the United States Capitol which are led
 by employees and interns of offices of Members of Con gress and other offices of the House of Representatives
 and Senate.

5 (b) At the direction of the Capitol Police Board, or at the direction of the Architect of the Capitol with the 6 7 approval of the Capitol Police Board, guided tours of the 8 United States Capitol which are led by employees and in-9 terns described in subsection (a) may be suspended tempo-10 rarily or otherwise subject to restriction for security or related reasons to the same extent as guided tours of the 11 United States Capitol which are led by the Architect of 12 the Capitol. 13

14 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendment made by15 subsection (a) shall take effect on the date of the enact-16 ment of this Act.
