20 LIMITATION ON AMOUNT AVAILABLE TO LEASE VEHICLES

21 SEC. 211. None of the funds made available in this 22 Act may be used by the Chief Administrative Officer of 23 the House of Representatives to make any payments from 24 any Members' Representational Allowance for the leasing 25 of a vehicle, excluding mobile district offices, in an aggre1 gate amount that exceeds \$1,000 for the vehicle in any2 month.

5 SEC. 212. None of the funds made available by this
