A BILL

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2015, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
4	money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
5	Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September
6	30, 2015, and for other purposes, namely:
7	TITLE I—LEGISLATIVE BRANCH
8	HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
9	SALARIES AND EXPENSES
10	For salaries and expenses of the House of Represent-
11	atives, \$1,180,736,000, as follows:
12	House Leadership Offices
13	For salaries and expenses, as authorized by law,
14	\$22,278,891, including: Office of the Speaker,
15	\$6,645,417, including \$25,000 for official expenses of the
16	Speaker; Office of the Majority Floor Leader, \$2,180,048,
17	including \$10,000 for official expenses of the Majority
18	Leader; Office of the Minority Floor Leader, \$7,114,471,
19	including \$10,000 for official expenses of the Minority
20	Leader; Office of the Majority Whip, including the Chief
21	Deputy Majority Whip, \$1,886,632, including \$5,000 for

 amount for salaries and expenses shall remain available

For salaries and expenses of standing committees, special and select, authorized by House resolutions, \$123,903,173: *Provided*, That such amount shall remain available for such salaries and expenses until December 31, 2016, except that \$2,300,000 of such amount shall remain available until expended for committee room upgrading.

19 Committee on Appropriations

For salaries and expenses of the Committee on Appropriations, \$23,271,004, including studies and examinations of executive agencies and temporary personal services for such committee, to be expended in accordance with section 202(b) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 and to be available for reimbursement to agencies for services performed: *Provided*, That such amount shall
 remain available for such salaries and expenses until De cember 31, 2016.

5 For compensation and expenses of officers and employees, as authorized by law, \$171,344,864, including: 6 7 for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Clerk, includ-8 ing the positions of the Chaplain and the Historian, and 9 including not more than \$25,000 for official representative 10 and reception expenses, of which not more than \$20,000 is for the Family Room and not more than \$2,000 is for 11 the Office of the Chaplain, \$24,009,473; for salaries and 12 13 expenses of the Office of the Sergeant at Arms, including the position of Superintendent of Garages and the Office 14 15 of Emergency Management, and including not more than \$3,000 for official representation and reception expenses, 16 17 \$11,926,729 of which \$4,344,000 shall remain available until expended; for salaries and expenses of the Office of 18 the Chief Administrative Officer including not more than 19 20 \$3,000 for official representation and reception expenses, 21 \$113,100,000, of which \$4,000,000 shall remain available 22 until expended; for salaries and expenses of the Office of 23 the Inspector General, \$4,741,809; for salaries and ex-24 penses of the Office of General Counsel, \$1,340,987; for 25 salaries and expenses of the Office of the Parliamentarian,

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including the Parliamentarian, \$2,000 for preparing the 1 Digest of Rules, and not more than \$1,000 for official rep-2 3 resentation and reception expenses, \$1,952,249; for sala-4 ries and expenses of the Office of the Law Revision Coun-5 sel of the House, \$4,087,587, of which \$1,000,000 shall 6 remain available until expended for the completion of the 7 House Modernization Initiative: for salaries and expenses 8 of the Office of the Legislative Counsel of the House, 9 \$8,892,975, of which \$540,000 shall remain available 10 until expended for the completion of the House Modernization Initiative; for salaries and expenses of the Office of 11 12 Interparliamentary Affairs, \$814,069; for other author-13 ized employees, \$478,986.

14 Allowances and Expenses

15 For allowances and expenses as authorized by House resolution or law, \$285,620,336, including: supplies, mate-16 17 rials, administrative costs and Federal tort claims, 18 \$4,152,789; official mail for committees, leadership of-19 fices, and administrative offices of the House, \$190,486; 20 Government contributions for health, retirement, Social 21 Security. other applicable employee and benefits. 22 \$256,635,776, to remain available until March 31, 2016; 23 Business Continuity and Disaster Recovery, \$16,217,008 24 of which \$5,000,000 shall remain available until expended; transition 25 activities for new members and staff.

\$3,737,000, to remain available until expended; Wounded
Warrior Program \$2,500,000, to remain available until
expended; Office of Congressional Ethics, \$1,467,030; and
miscellaneous items including purchase, exchange, maintenance, repair and operation of House motor vehicles,
interparliamentary receptions, and gratuities to heirs of
deceased employees of the House, \$720,247.

8 Administrative Provisions

9 SEC. 101. (a) REQUIRING AMOUNTS REMAINING IN MEMBERS' REPRESENTATIONAL ALLOWANCES TO BE 10 USED FOR DEFICIT REDUCTION OR TO REDUCE THE 11 12 FEDERAL DEBT.—Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any amounts appropriated under this Act for 13 "HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—SALARIES AND 14 15 EXPENSES—MEMBERS' Representational ALLOW-ANCES" shall be available only for fiscal year 2015. Any 16 17 amount remaining after all payments are made under such allowances for fiscal year 2015 shall be deposited in the 18 19 Treasury and used for deficit reduction (or, if there is no 20Federal budget deficit after all such payments have been 21 made, for reducing the Federal debt, in such manner as 22 the Secretary of the Treasury considers appropriate).

(b) REGULATIONS.—The Committee on House Administration of the House of Representatives shall have
authority to prescribe regulations to carry out this section.

(c) DEFINITION.—As used in this section, the term
 "Member of the House of Representatives" means a Rep resentative in, or a Delegate or Resident Commissioner
 to, the Congress.

5 DELIVERY OF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

6 SEC. 102. None of the funds made available in this 7 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of a bill, joint 8 resolution, or resolution to the office of a Member of the 9 House of Representatives (including a Delegate or Resi-10 dent Commissioner to the Congress) unless the Member 11 requests a copy.

12 DELIVERY OF CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

SEC. 103. None of the funds made available by this
Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of any version
of the Congressional Record to the office of a Member of
the House of Representatives (including a Delegate or
Resident Commissioner to the Congress).

18 LIMITATION ON AMOUNT AVAILABLE TO LEASE VEHICLES

19 SEC. 104. None of the funds made available in this 20 Act may be used by the Chief Administrative Officer of 21 the House of Representatives to make any payments from 22 any Members' Representational Allowance for the leasing 23 of a vehicle, excluding mobile district offices, in an aggre-24 gate amount that exceeds \$1,000 for the vehicle in any 25 month.

3 For salaries of employees of the Capitol Police, in-4 cluding overtime, hazardous duty pay, and Government 5 contributions for health, retirement, social security, professional liability insurance, and other applicable employee 6 7 benefits, \$286,500,000 of which overtime shall not exceed 8 \$23,425,000 unless the Committee on Appropriations of 9 the House and Senate are notified, to be disbursed by the 10 Chief of the Capitol Police or his designee.

GENERAL EXPENSES

12 For necessary expenses of the Capitol Police, including motor vehicles, communications and other equipment, 13 14 security equipment and installation, uniforms, weapons, 15 supplies, materials, training, medical services, forensic services, stenographic services, personal and professional 16 17 services, the employee assistance program, the awards pro-18 gram, postage, communication services, travel advances, 19 relocation of instructor and liaison personnel for the Fed-20 eral Law Enforcement Training Center, and not more 21 than \$5,000 to be expended on the certification of the 22 Chief of the Capitol Police in connection with official rep-23 resentation and reception expenses, \$61,459,000, to be 24disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol Police or his designee: Provided, That, notwithstanding any other provi-25

sion of law, the cost of basic training for the Capitol Police
 at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center for fis cal year 2015 shall be paid by the Secretary of Homeland
 Security from funds available to the Department of Home land Security.

6 OFFICE OF COMPLIANCE7 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

8 For salaries and expenses of the Office of Compli-9 ance, as authorized by section 305 of the Congressional 10 Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1385), \$3,959,000, of which \$450,000 shall remain available until September 11 12 30, 2016: *Provided*, That not more than \$500 may be expended on the certification of the Executive Director of 13 the Office of Compliance in connection with official rep-14 15 resentation and reception expenses.

16 CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE

17 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For salaries and expenses necessary for operation of the Congressional Budget Office, including not more than \$6,000 to be expended on the certification of the Director of the Congressional Budget Office in connection with official representation and reception expenses, \$45,700,000.

3 For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, and 4 other personal services, at rates of pay provided by law; 5 for surveys and studies in connection with activities under the care of the Architect of the Capitol; for all necessary 6 expenses for the general and administrative support of the 7 8 operations under the Architect of the Capitol including the 9 Botanic Garden; electrical substations of the Capitol, Senate and House office buildings, and other facilities under 10 the jurisdiction of the Architect of the Capitol; including 11 12 furnishings and office equipment; including not more than 13 \$5,000 for official reception and representation expenses, to be expended as the Architect of the Capitol may ap-14 15 prove; for purchase or exchange, maintenance, and operation of a passenger motor vehicle, \$91,555,000. 16

19 and operation of the Capitol, \$53,126,000, of which
20 \$28,817,000 shall remain available until September 30,

of grounds surrounding the Capitol, the Senate and House
office buildings, and the Capitol Power Plant,

12 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care 13 and operation of the Capitol Power Plant; lighting, heating, power (including the purchase of electrical energy) 14 15 and water and sewer services for the Capitol, Senate and House office buildings, Library of Congress buildings, and 16 the grounds about the same, Botanic Garden, Senate ga-17 rage, and air conditioning refrigeration not supplied from 18 plants in any of such buildings; heating the Government 19 Printing Office and Washington City Post Office, and 20 21 heating and chilled water for air conditioning for the Su-22 preme Court Building, the Union Station complex, the 23 Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Building and the 24 Folger Shakespeare Library, expenses for which shall be 25 advanced or reimbursed upon request of the Architect of

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1 the Capitol and amounts so received shall be deposited
2 into the Treasury to the credit of this appropriation,
3 \$93,152,000, of which \$8,686,000 shall remain available
4 until September 30, 2019: *Provided*, That not more than
5 \$9,000,000 of the funds credited or to be reimbursed to
6 this appropriation as herein provided shall be available for
7 obligation during fiscal year 2015.

15 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
16 and operation of buildings, grounds and security enhance17 ments of the United States Capitol Police, wherever lo18 cated, the Alternate Computer Facility, and AOC security
19 operations, \$19,486,000, of which \$1,000,000 shall re20 main available until September 30, 2019.

21 BOTANIC GARDEN

For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care and operation of the Botanic Garden and the nurseries, buildings, grounds, and collections; and purchase and exchange, maintenance, repair, and operation of a passenger

1	motor vehicle; all under the direction of the Joint Com-
2	mittee on the Library, \$15,022,946, of which \$5,122,946
3	shall remain available until September 30, 2019: Provided,
4	That of the amount made available under this heading,

22	For necessary expenses of the Library of Congress
23	not otherwise provided for, including development and
24	maintenance of the Library's catalogs; custody and custo-
25	dial care of the Library buildings; special clothing; clean-

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ing, laundering and repair of uniforms; preservation of 1 motion pictures in the custody of the Library; operation 2 3 and maintenance of the American Folklife Center in the 4 Library; activities under the Civil Rights History Project 5 Act of 2009; preparation and distribution of catalog records and other publications of the Library; hire or pur-6 7 chase of one passenger motor vehicle; and expenses of the 8 Library of Congress Trust Fund Board not properly 9 chargeable to the income of any trust fund held by the 10 Board, \$424,057,000, of which not more than \$6,000,000 shall be derived from collections credited to this appropria-11 tion during fiscal year 2015, and shall remain available 12 13 until expended, under the Act of June 28, 1902 (chapter 1301; 32 Stat. 480; 2 U.S.C. 150) and not more than 14 15 \$350,000 shall be derived from collections during fiscal year 2015 and shall remain available until expended for 16 the development and maintenance of an international legal 17 information database and activities related thereto: Pro-18 *vided*, That the Library of Congress may not obligate or 19 expend any funds derived from collections under the Act 20 21 of June 28, 1902, in excess of the amount authorized for obligation or expenditure in appropriations Acts: Provided 22 *further*, That the total amount available for obligation 23 24 shall be reduced by the amount by which collections are 25 less than \$6,350,000: Provided further, That of the total

amount appropriated, not more than \$12,000 may be ex pended, on the certification of the Librarian of Congress,

6 For authorized printing and binding for the Congress 7 and the distribution of Congressional information in any 8 format; expenses necessary for preparing the semimonthly 9 and session index to the Congressional Record, as author-10 ized by law (section 902 of title 44, United States Code); printing and binding of Government publications author-11 ized by law to be distributed to Members of Congress; and 12 13 printing, binding, and distribution of Government publications authorized by law to be distributed without charge 14 15 to the recipient, \$79,736,000: *Provided*, That this appropriation shall not be available for paper copies of the per-16 manent edition of the Congressional Record for individual 17 Representatives, Resident Commissioners or Delegates au-18 thorized under section 906 of title 44, United States Code: 19 *Provided further*, That this appropriation shall be available 20 21 for the payment of obligations incurred under the appro-22 priations for similar purposes for preceding fiscal years: 23 *Provided further*, That notwithstanding the 2-year limita-24 tion under section 718 of title 44, United States Code, 25 none of the funds appropriated or made available under

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this Act or any other Act for printing and binding and 1 2 related services provided to Congress under chapter 7 of 3 title 44, United States Code, may be expended to print 4 a document, report, or publication after the 27-month pe-5 riod beginning on the date that such document, report, or publication is authorized by Congress to be printed, un-6 7 less Congress reauthorizes such printing in accordance 8 with section 718 of title 44, United States Code: Provided 9 *further*, That any unobligated or unexpended balances in 10 this account or accounts for similar purposes for preceding fiscal years may be transferred to the Government Print-11 ing Office revolving fund for carrying out the purposes of 12 this heading, subject to the approval of the Committees 13 on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and 14 15 Senate: *Provided further*, That notwithstanding sections 16 901, 902, and 906 of title 44, United States Code, this 17 appropriation may be used to prepare indexes to the Con-18 gressional Record on only a monthly and session basis. 19 OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT OF DOCUMENTS 20 SALARIES AND EXPENSES 21 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS) 22 For expenses of the Office of Superintendent of Doc-23 uments necessary to provide for the cataloging and index-

24 ing of Government publications and their distribution to25 the public, Members of Congress, other Government agen-

cies, and designated depository and international exchange 1 2 libraries as authorized by law, \$31,500,000: Provided, 3 That amounts of not more than \$2,000,000 from current 4 year appropriations are authorized for producing and dis-5 seminating Congressional serial sets and other related publications for fiscal years 2013 and 2014 to depository 6 and other designated libraries: Provided further, That any 7 8 unobligated or unexpended balances in this account or ac-9 counts for similar purposes for preceding fiscal years may 10 be transferred to the Government Printing Office revolving fund for carrying out the purposes of this heading, 11 12 subject to the approval of the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and Senate. 13

14 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE REVOLVING FUND

Whenever in this Act any office or position not specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of 2 3 1929 (46 Stat. 32 et seq.) is appropriated for or the rate 4 of compensation or designation of any office or position 5 appropriated for is different from that specifically established by such Act, the rate of compensation and the des-6 7 ignation in this Act shall be the permanent law with re-8 spect thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions in this Act 9 for the various items of official expenses of Members, offi-10 cers, and committees of the Senate and House of Representatives, and clerk hire for Senators and Members of 11 the House of Representatives shall be the permanent law 12 13 with respect thereto.

14 SEC. 204. The expenditure of any appropriation 15 under this Act for any consulting service through procurement contract, under section 3109 of title 5, United States 16 17 Code, shall be limited to those contracts where such expenditures are a matter of public record and available for 18 19 public inspection, except where otherwise provided under 20existing law, or under existing Executive order issued 21 under existing law.

SEC. 205. Amounts available for administrative expenses of any legislative branch entity which participates
in the Legislative Branch Financial Managers Council
(LBFMC) established by charter on March 26, 1996, shall

1 be available to finance an appropriate share of LBFMC costs as determined by the LBFMC, except that the total 2 3 LBFMC costs to be shared among all participating legisla-4 tive branch entities (in such allocations among the entities 5 as the entities may determine) may not exceed \$2,000. 6 SEC. 206. The Architect of the Capitol, in consulta-7 tion with the District of Columbia, is authorized to main-8 tain and improve the landscape features, excluding streets, 9 in the irregular shaped grassy areas bounded by Wash-10 ington Avenue, SW on the northeast, Second Street, SW on the west, Square 582 on the south, and the beginning 11 12 of the I–395 tunnel on the southeast.

SEC. 207. None of the funds made available in this
Act may be transferred to any department, agency, or instrumentality of the United States Government, except
pursuant to a transfer made by, or transfer authority provided in, this Act or any other appropriation Act.

18 SEC. 208. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), 19 none of the funds made available to the Architect of the 20 Capitol in this Act may be used to eliminate or restrict 21 guided tours of the United States Capitol which are led 22 by employees and interns of offices of Members of Con-23 gress and other offices of the House of Representatives 24 and Senate.

(b) At the direction of the Capitol Police Board, or 1 at the direction of the Architect of the Capitol with the 2 3 approval of the Capitol Police Board, guided tours of the 4 United States Capitol which are led by employees and in-5 terns described in subsection (a) may be suspended temporarily or otherwise subject to restriction for security or re-6 7 lated reasons to the same extent as guided tours of the 8 United States Capitol which are led by the Architect of 9 the Capitol.

SEC. 209. Notwithstanding any other provision of
law, no adjustment shall be made under section 610(a)
of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 (2 U.S.C.
31) (relating to cost of living adjustments for Members
of Congress) during fiscal year 2015.

SEC. 210. The amount by which the applicable allocation of new budget authority made by the Committee on
Appropriations of the House of Representatives under section 302(b) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, excluding Senate items, exceeds the amount of proposed new
budget authority is \$0.

This Act may be cited as the "Legislative Branch Ap-propriations Act, 2015".
