Welcome to our first Full Committee markup of the Fiscal Year 2014 Appropriations cycle. Thank you, everyone, for being present today to start this important process.

First of all, I want to say that our heart and prayers are with the people of Oklahoma and all those that were hit by devastating tornados yesterday. The district of our friend and colleague, Mr. Cole, took a direct and severe hit, and today, he is in his district with his people. I ask that you keep him and those he represents in your thoughts. This is indeed a terrible tragedy, and we stand at the ready to do what we can to assist those in need.
